Area of Focus 1: Student Achievemen

A. Describe how the LEA will use Title I, Part A funds to develop and implement a well-rounded program of instruction to meet the academic needs of all students.

Suwannee County School District's, (SCSD) program of instruction is developed through comprehensive needs assessment (CNA). The district data team (DDT) collaboratively conducts 3-year trend data analysis and identifies areas of strength and challenges in the following areas -FSA ELA, FSA Math, FSA Science, FSA Student Performance by subgroup and Federal Index, Progress Monitoring Data. other data sources (behavior and attendance), School Grade Criteria, Teacher Effectiveness and Parent Involvement survey results. Each school also reviews curriculum and instruction practices and resources, staff development, quality teaching, leadership, and family engagement. The CNA allows each school to address thier indivdual needs. This approach provides a more cohensive and consistent view of student achievement and Title I, Part A funds will provide for planning and implementation of program of instruction that is well-rounded.

B. Describe how the LEA will use Title I, Part A funds to identify students who may be at risk for academic failure (may use Early Warning Systems in Schoolwide Improvement Plans to identify at-risk students).

SCSD reviews and discusses assessment data with parents, teachers, academic coaches and students and collaborate to create specific action plan to promote a growth mindset for student success. In addition, SCSD will use Title I, Part A funds to provide for the intervention supports in place for at-risk students and develops additional at-risk programming to provide early intervention support as needs are identified.

C. Describe how the LEA will use Title I, Part A funds to provide additional educational assistance to individual students the LEA or school determines need help in meeting Florida's challenging academic standards.

Title I, Part A (TIPA) funds will provide for additional intervention time for students that are identified as Tier 2 and Tier 3. Intervention will be delivered either by in small group instruction or 1-on-1 instruction with a state certified teacher or highly qualified paraprofessional. SCSD will allocate Title I, Part A funds for additional web-based instructional software that provides prescriptive intervention based on the individual student. The software will allow teachers to further differentiate interventions for students based on their individual needs. Supplemental resources for small group and individual instruction are also included in software.

D. Describe how the LEA will use Title I, Part A funds to identify and implement instruction and other strategies intended to strengthen and improve school conditions for student learning.

All SCSD instructional staff asre state certified and crendentialed to teach low socio-economic and minority students. The District allocates Title II, Part A funds to support a new hire induction program to provide training to newly hired teachers in the areas of Florida Standards, curriculum resources, assessments, classroom management, student engagement, literacy, and supporting students in poverty. Additionally, teadhers with an alternative certification method are supported to move from temporary certification to professional certification through the district's affiliation with North East Florida Educational Consortium (NEFEC), and the Professional Development Certification Program, (PDCP).

E. Describe the LEA's strategy to implement supporting efforts to reduce the overuse of discipline practices that remove students from the classroom. This may include identifying and supporting schools with high rates of discipline, disaggregated by each of the subgroups of students, as identified in section 1112(c)(2).

Suwannee County School District implements In-School Suspension, (ISS), Suwannee Opportunity School, (SOS) and behavior supports in place to minimize time out of school These strategies help reduce the overusage of removing students from the classroom. When students are afforded these opportunities they are still provided the same quality education as in school students.

F. Describe the activities that will be implemented to address Area of Focus 1. List by number the detailed activities that will be implemented to address this Area of Focus (Numbering the activities will be essential to connect each activity to a budget line).

1. Supplemental Classroom Teachers - Salaries for supplemental resource teachers to provide interventions to L1 and L2 students high expectations for academically demanding instruction will be supported using a variety of instructional materials including supplemental books, research-based, adaptive - online curriculum and alternative pathways to graduation. The LEA will fund up to four (4) supplemental teachers with a mean salary of \$56,867 per school and this grant will fund up to 100% of each salary. THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THIS ACTIVITY IS \$227,486. Title I funds (\$2,000.00) will also provide for dues and membership fees for the teachers to online professional community (Franklin Covey) throughout the school year.

2. Academic Coaches (Resource Teachers) will directly support students through differentiated instruction and ensure that classrooms have access to supplemental resources. The LEA will fund up to four (4) supplemental teachers with a mean salary of \$55,480 per school, and this grant will fund up to 50% of each salary. THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THIS ACTIVITY IS \$110,960.

3. Supplemental Professional Development - Title I funds will provide for supplemental PD delivered by embedded academic coaches, district trainers, professional consultants, registration for professional conferences, and memberships with professional organizations/affiliations to enable administrators and teachers to share a strong sense of responsibility for student development, school improvement, and professional growth. Title I funds will be used to support PD and collaborative opportunities (e.g. observe model classrooms, and engage in lesson study) for instructional staff by providing substitute classroom/resource teachers and paraprofessionals for participants. Substitutes will be provided through contracted services with a staffing agency (e.g. Kelly Services). The total amount allocated for substitutes THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THIS ACTIVITY IS \$8,000.

4. Supplemental Online Resources - Purchase of supplemental online resources - i-Ready (60%), Performance Matters (100%), Edgenuity (57%), Study Island (100%), Write Score (100%) THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THIS ACTIVITY IS \$208,000.00, breakdown: computer hardware (non-cap) - computer mice, keyboards, \$500, technology related (non-cap) furniture, and fixtures & equipment - scanner \$500; computer software - setup software for chrome student computer - \$250.00; Technology Related Supplies headphones, computer cables/cords, power cords, toner; \$500.

6. MTSS Support Facilitator - Grant funds will provide 100% of the salary of one (1) multi-tiered systems of support, (MTSS) facilitator (\$47,500.00) to assist in response to intervention (Rtl) problem solving methods; Title I funds (\$60,401.29) will provide for Coordinator of Math K-12 (.7 FTE) to support classroom teachers through strategies, model instruction and resources. This is Discretionary Educational Services Funded at the School Level.

7. Paraprofessionals - Salaries for paraprofessionals to assist targeted students to achieve academic goals and support differentiated small group instruction or 1:1 support. The LEA will fund 35 paraprofessional positions with a mean salary of 21,228 per school, and this grant will fund up to 100% of each salary. THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THIS ACTIVITY IS \$742,982.19. Salaries for ESE paraprofessionals (3 FTE) - this activity total \$61,890.15.

8. A. Provide a description of how the LEA will address Parent and Family Engagement.

Suwannee County School District implements a district advisory council, (DAC) to involve parents in the joint development and revisions to the Title I Application/LEA Plan/PFEP and in decisions on how PFE funds are used in the schools. The district advisory council (DAC) meets the requirements of Florida Statutes 1001.452 to include principals, teachers, education support employees, students, parents, and other business and community citizens who are representative of the ethnic, racial, and economic community served by the school. The DAC is made up

of representatives that service on school support committees at each Title I school. Parents volunteer to participate while others are recruited by school administrators. Stakeholders' input is recorded in the minutes from meetings and reflected in survey data.

Schools extend invitations for parents to attend meetings during Open House, Title I Annual Meetings, face to face, in newsletters, backpacks, school and district websites and social media platforms. The Title I Application/LEA Plan/PFEP is presented to parents at the end of the school year for evaluation purposes and planning the next year. Parents and school staff work together to provide input on the plans from the prior year in order to make plans for the following year for how funds will be spent. Parents are provided information on the Title I allocation, the PFEP allocation, and the amount that will be allocated to each individual school. Parents use the evaluation results of the prior year to determine if the funding was used in an effective way and whether funds should continue to be used in the same manner. If parents have new ideas for how funds should be spent, the DAC discusses and agrees on whether to implement new activities. Input from parents is recorded during the meetings and submitted to the Title I office for Title I planning.

Effective PFE activities and strategies are included in the district plan. The district parent liaison assists with schools' PFE activities, parent resource room, and other tasks related to Parent and Family Engagement. Opportunities will be made available for district staff to attend school support committee meetings and/or Open House activities to present parent and family engagement information.

Schools plan events for parents that align with parent requests and students' needs throughout the year. Parents are supported through the front office staff, the district parent liaison, the parent and family engagement team (PFET), and classroom teachers that are specifically designed for each family and students' needs. Schools maintain activity logs that are used to ensure activities offered provide meaningful opportunities for parents to become more involved in their child's education. Documentation will be attendance records, agendas, written comments, and evaluations.

Schools meet throughout the year to review and update the PFEP. During these meetings, activities and strategies are addressed to ensure the PFEP is being implemented with fidelity and in a timely manner.

Input from parents and school staff is collected on the development, implementation, and evaluation of the PFEP. The annual review and evaluation meeting at the end of the school year reviews the district's plan and practices and revises the PFEP as needed based on the information from surveys, parent participation, and face to face interviews. The content and quality of the PFEP are evaluated by the DAC, which include parents, business, community leaders, and stakeholders. Each school will identify barriers to parent participation and present the findings to the SACs and are noted in the meeting notes. The results of the evaluation are used to design strategies for more effective family engagement. Each school will also identify whether the PFEP activities promoted the student academic performance.

1. Parent and Family Engagement Team (PFET) - hold quarterly collaboration meetings to strategically problem solve and coordinate services to. Parent liaisons and coordinators of various federal programs with parent involvement requirements meet to collaborate regarding parent/family engagement activities, best practices, professional development and troubleshooting. This is an LEA level activity.

2. District Advisory Council (DAC) meetings - Meetings will be held monthly with stakeholders (parents, community partners, school-level and district-level personnel) to dissemination information and collaboration to improve student achievement. Parents and school support committees provide input to the Title I application/LEA Plan/PFEP and school compacts.

3. Contracted Services for Parent Liaison - Provides LEA/school level support to parents and families, schools and community partners for children in grades K-12. The goal of this activity is to help close learning gaps and create opportunities for students by engaging parents, students, teachers and community partners with all aspects of student achievement and success. Duties include: Collaboration - with community partners throughout the school year to continue academic achievement and parent/student/school connection (school level); provides technical assistance to schools with planning parent engagement activities, school compacts, attendance initiatives and creating a comprehensive plan to build capacity between parents, schools and community; Provide training to school level personnel and guidance on how to build school/parent capacity, handle challenges inside and outside of the home; Provide information through informal means (i.e. school visits, email, telephone calls, publications and postings on the LEA website and social media platforms. Additional training on family engagement strategies and materials. District Advisory Council - The LEA hosts District Advisory Council - the test of school verses for Parent Liaison -

4. Area of Focus 3: Homeless Education

A. Provide a description of how the LEA will address Homeless Education.

In 2020-2021, 240 students meet the critieria for the Homeless Education Program, (HEP). Services to homeless children and youth will be supported through coordination of Title I,Part A funds and other federal programs and collaborative partners. Suwannee County School District also recieves Title IX, Education of Homeless and Children and Youth (EHCY). December: Private schools in Suwannee County are contacted to determine which programs they would like to participate in for the approaching school year. In the letter, private schools are invited to an informational meeting wherein the District presents information about all of the various federal programs the school district participates in. Alternate arrangements are made for the private schools that express interest in receiving information, but are unable to attend the meeting.

January-February: The first consultation meeting occurs in which the District provides copies of family income surveys that will be distributed and conducted during the reporting period (Survey 3). Timelines for additional meetings are established at this meeting.

April-May: The District reviews the results of the family income surveys with each participating private school to identify students that will are eligible for services. A tentative equitable amount is set based on the number and percentage of eligible students ate each private school. A tentative start date at each participating private school is set.

June-August: Collaborate and communicate with third-party contractor on teacher hiring, placement, and training. Review evaluation results. (August) - Implementation program and provide ongoing consultation.

July-August: Review evaluation results. The final roster of participating students is completed. The start date for services is confirmed.

September: Instructional services, parent and family engagement activities begin.

October-June: The District conducts monitoring in the private school Title I program and monitors the activities of the third-party provider and its employees. During these visits the District informally assess the progress of students and the effectiveness of the program.

Note: There is an Inter-District Agreement and established, ongoing communication with Columbia County concerning students that have been identified as residing in Suwannee County, but attend private schools in Columbia County. Neighboring districts are also contacted to inquire about the possibility of students residing in Suwannee County and attend a private school in a neighboring district. Inter-District Agreements are developed during this time period. Districts that send students to Suwannee County to attend school are invited to participate in consultation meetings with the private schools.

Suwannee County School District's method for identifying low-income students is through use of an anonymous survey that collects income, students' grade level and address data are collected from all private schools that indicate an interest in participation in the Title I program. This method provides confidentiality of the data since the LEA does not know the identify of the respondents. Each private school assigns a unique control number to each survey for the private schools' use and auditing and monitoring purposes. The Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines are used in determining eligibility for free and reduced-price meals. The survey asks the family income is in the range of students that receive free and reduced lunch, in the family qualifies for food stamps, and if the family currently receives Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. If the family answers yes to any of the questions, then they are identified as low income. If the same family resides in a Title I school zone, these students for services.

The evaluation will occur in several ways. An informal assessment will be conducted throughout the school year through observation and monitoring of the Title I program at the private school. Additionally, the LEA will examine the results of the nationally normed reference test scores from the assessment administered by each private school given at the end of the 2021-2022 school year to determine the number and percentage of students that score above the 39th percentile that will exit the Title I program. Furthermore, the LEA will examine the assessment scores generated through the third party contractors beginning and ending assessment to determine student growth. In addition, parent and teacher surveys will be administered to assess the perceived impact of the program. The surveys will be conducted at the close of the 2021-22 school year. The results of the surveys will be shared with the private schools and the third party contractor and are made available to parents.

Catapult Learning, the third party contractor, provides teacher tutors, tutoring services, academic counseling, professional development activities, and parent and family engagement activities. Catapult Learning provides the curriculum used for all supplemental academic student services. Through collaboration with the Suwannee County School District, Catapult Learning provides the trainers and materials used during the professional development activities as well as the parent and family engagement activities. Catapult Learning shares all student achievement data and attendance data (student, parent, and the teacher) with Suwannee County Schools to assist with the evaluation of the program. Through consultation with the private school officials concerning roll forward funds, the funds will be used to expand the length, duration and/or increase the number of students that will receive supplemental instructional services, additional professional development activation with the private school officials. In addition to the supplemental instructional services, additional professional development services and/or parent and family engagement services may be offered.

A. Describe the activities that will be implemented to ensure that transportation will be provided to maintain children in foster care in the school of origin unless there is a determination that is not in the child's best interest.

In partnership with the community-based welfare agency - Partnership for Strong Families, (PSF) a procedure in making a best interest determination to maintain children in foster care in their school of orgin. The LEA receives notification from PSF that the best interest of determination meeting is needed. The LEA then coordinates a meeting between school representatives, the LEA foster care liaison and PSF. The caseworker represents the child and the parent/guardian during the meeting. All parties discuss the topics asa outlined in the School Stability Checklist along with all other topics of concern. At the end of the meeting all the participating parties come to concensus. The Coordinator of of Student and Family Support arranges for the child to recieve transportation to the school of origin.

B. Describe the activities that will be implemented to ensure the successful enrollment and transfer of records of children enrolled in a new school, even if they do not have the required documentation.

The Director of Student Services provides ongoing training to school level personnel to ensure that children in foster care are immediately enrolled in school, even if the child is unable to produce records normally required for enrollment. The enrolling school immediately contacts the student's last school attended to obtain relevant academic records and other important information. Transfer of students' records within the LEA is automatic as a result of the student information system (FOCUS) the LEA uses. For students transferring out of the district, the school enrollment notifies the sending school concerning the transfger of students' records and maintains a copy of the request and each subsequent request.

C. Describe the activities that will be implemented to ensure the development and implementation of clear, written procedures for how transportation will be provided, arranged, and funded for a child's duration of time in foster care in collaboration with the appropriate Child Welfare Agency (CWA).

Suwannee County School District and PSF will ensure that children in foster care who need transportation to the school of origin will promptly receive transportation of in a cost effective manner and in accordance with the federal Social Security Act.
